Rabbi's Reflections

Shanah Tovah! We made it through the 5783 High Holidays. The month of Tishrei is packed full of holidays but it is always fun to have a full synagogue, reconnect with friends who have fallen out of touch, and experience the renewed energy of a new year.

We have many fun, exciting, socially engaging, and deeply intellectual events coming up with many more in the planning stages. A few I would like to highlight:

Prayer/ Minyanim:

For the past few months, many Friday nights and occasional Saturdays, we have really struggled to reach a minyan, many times having to interrupt services to “recruit” people. This is hard for those who make a point to attend, especially regularly. We are a small shul and so everyone counts, and that is literal when it comes to prayer and minyanim. If **every member** of our congregation **attended 1-2 times per month** we would consistently reach a minyan and not have to scramble trying to find more people. In addition, for months now we have been hosting in person services on the first Friday of the month and the 1st and 3rd Saturdays of the month. Unfortunately, attendance in person is very low. The good news is we normally reach a minyan counting folks on Zoom but for those who attend in person it is frustrating to be only one of three people present. *Frankly, it's lonely.* In addition it is very challenging to run a Torah service with four or less people. There are lots of moving parts and we have the added duties of monitoring Zoom and displaying the Siddur.

Over the next month or so we hope to restart our kiddush which we hope will encourage more to attend in person but again, if you are able please make the added effort of coming in person.

Adult Education:

We are doing things a little differently this year with adult education. We are doing shorter sessions on different topics. For example this Fall, Nancy Margolis will be facilitating, with me, a wonderful course on writing and Jewish Identity. This course works best with a small, consistent group. Right now about half the class is full but we would love to have a few more folks join us. If you have been looking for a class that doesn't present material in a traditional/ lecture modality, then this is the course for you!

I will also be teaching about 2nd Century Judaism and the colorful character Elisha Ben Abuya through a group reading and discussion of the book *As A Driven Leaf* by Milton Steinberg. The 2nd century was a time of intense assimilation, many argue similar to our experiences today. In addition, Elisha Ben Abuya is a wonderful character who was later excommunicated from Judaism, asks very important philosophical questions that many of us probably have and do ask ourselves such as: Is there a G-d? And how does G-d interact with our world?

Please RSVP to the office or me so we know how many to expect for each class.

In short, this is a plea to come and join us! We want to be in community with you, we want to see you and spend time with you. We want to learn and pray with you. Let's make 5783 a year of connection!

Or perhaps think back to when you were a child, young adult and with beloved grandparents and relatives? These memories serve as blessings, and spiritual building blocks for our family's future. Baruch Ha Shem, this year we came together with our children and community and celebrated in person; how awesome is that?

This was the first year Or Shalom Religious School was "solo" again after many years as a joint school with another synagogue. Our parents have been extremely helpful in attending "schul" with their children during the *Chagim*, donating their time and talents to various events and helping us to reestablish ourselves as a Religious School, and we thank you.

The Mitzvah of "Talmud Torah" is a powerful one. Each time you "encourage" your child or grandchild to come to Or Shalom Religious School and our Or Shalom Community events, "Talmud Torah" is actualized for you and your family. May this year be filled with joy, and the ability to see joy and hidden blessings present in each and every day. May we "run for mitzvahs" when we see them, and be appreciative of the simple daily joys of life.

ADULT EDUCATION- "AS A DRIVEN LEAF"- WEDNESDAYS 7-8PM, ZOOM

Join Rabbi Kami as we read the classic book *As A Driven Leaf* by Milton Steinberg. Written in 1939, Steinberg's novel about the life of Elisha Ben Abuya (a famous Talmudic Rabbi who was later excommunicated). *As A Driven Leaf* wrestles with the 2nd century Jewish struggle to reconcile Rabbinic Judaism with Greek Hellenistic society. The debate regarding assimilating into the larger non-Jewish society is a topic all too familiar to 21st century Jews.

This class will focus on the content and themes of the book but also bring in information about the Talmudic period, Rabbinic Judaism (especially its early formation), and the cultural experience of 2nd century Jews.

Definition of Funds


