Rabbi's Reflections

I love Pesach. While it is probably the most stressful time of the year (yes, I argue even more stressful than the High Holidays) it is also a holiday I anticipate all year. I've come to understand that my love of Pesach is tied to the minute preparations that people take for these mere 8 days. Jews who are normally not observant at all, because of their emotional ties and positive memories of Pesach, take so much care in cleaning, buying, preparing for and living during Pesach. This is a beautiful thing to see, so many thinking so deeply about their Judaism and Jewish practice. Reflecting on how they were raised or experiences that shaped their Passover memories and attempting to incorporate that into their lives today. The focus on family and community is inspiring and lovely to witness. And when the evening of the first seder comes along, I can't help but think of all of the millions of people sitting down to share the seder, going through roughly the same order, drinking 4 glasses of wine or grape juice beaming when the youngest sings Mah Nishtana. Back in 2016 the Pew Research Center found that almost 70% of people who identify as Jewish participated in a Passover Seder in the US (that's more than double in percentage than any other Jewish ritual or practice).

Many folks are very strict when it comes to Passover preparations whether it be cleaning, purchasing or preparing food. I believe people are so attached to Pesach for a number of reasons:

- The memories associated with the holiday. So many of us have sweet memories of joining with friends and family around the seder table. We jokingly complain about how long the seder ran or the arguments that broke out over how "to do" the seder but almost all share these memories lovingly and fondly. People have memories of cooking with their grandparents and continuing their memories through recipes passed down through the family. Families have traditions that date back decades which they continue to prioritize every year to stay connected.
- The holiday promotes a proud Jewish identity based on overcoming injustice and focuses on the imperative of carrying on this identity to the next generation. The constant trope of imagining as if you were a slave in the land of Egypt freed through the Exodus ties people to a central Jewish identity based on a concrete universal narrative. Almost everyone wants good to prevail over evil, justice to overcome injustice, freedom for those oppressed.
- While there are many other reasons people are so attached to Pesach I think the number one reason it resonates so deeply with people is because of the ritual aspect of the holiday. The very effort of preparing an elaborate meal roughly based on menus held on to for decades, reaching out to family and friends to reconnect and invite to seder, and then sitting down for a significant amount of time retelling a triumphant story of courage, faith, and joy is a unifying experience.

I wish you a joyous and free Passover, united with friends and family through the wonderful Jewish ritual of the seder.

Rabbi Kami Knapp Schechter has full right to appoint any agent or substitute in her stead and said substitute shall have full right to sell and lease as provided herein.

Rabbi Kami Knapp Schechter also has the full power and right to act as she deems fit and proper in accordance with all the details of the Bill of Sale used in the transaction to sell all my Chametz, Chametz mixtures, etc., as provided herein.

This power is in conformity with all Torah, Rabbinic and Civil laws.

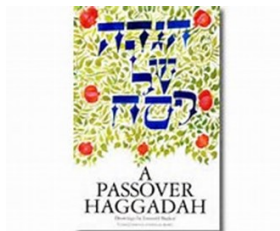

As you probably know by now, Cantor Freedman will be the next spiritual leader of Or Shalom. Based on the results of the survey that was held on March 25-26, we invited him to join us and he very happily accepted. If you completed the survey, you are probably one of those that liked him a lot and wanted him to join Or Shalom. A few did not, but more about that in a moment.

Rabbi Kami will stay with us until the end of April or May, and then Cantor Freeman start on July 15.

Cantor Freeman has a beautiful singing voice and a very friendly demeanor. He is also very flexible and easy to work with. I think that we are starting a long and important relationship that will be mutually rewarding.

- Attend social events (e.g. those organized by the men's club or sisterhood)

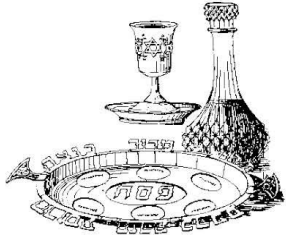

Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society: Israel Response

As families grieve the more than 1,200 lives lost, rockets continue to target heavily populated civilian centers across the country — and an estimated 136 people are still being held hostage in Gaza. An estimated 200,000-250,000 Israelis have been internally displaced, including dozens of communities near the Gaza Strip and along the border with Lebanon, where increased tensions have led the government to issue evacuation orders.

For more than 70 years, HIAS has used its presence in Israel to aid newcomers and refugees by providing services and creating safe spaces. Within 24 hours of the brutal attacks of October 7, HIAS activated its Emergency Response team to provide life-saving support and critical security information to asylum seekers and displaced families. Definition of Funds

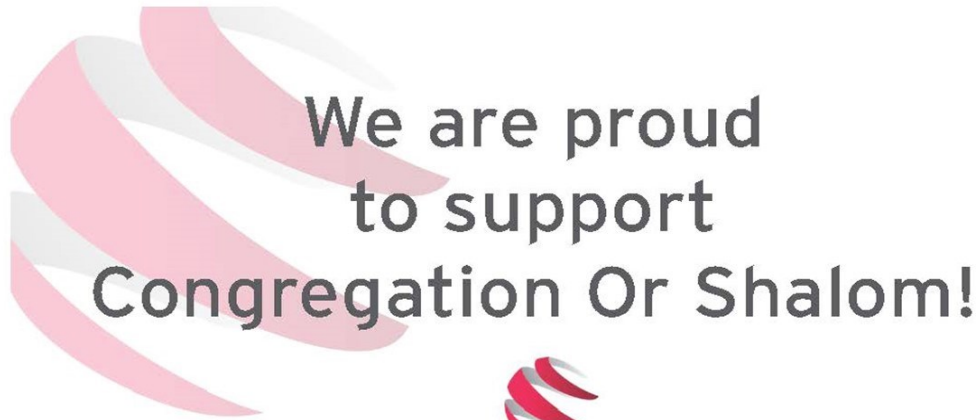

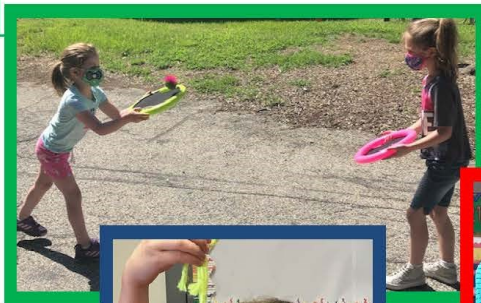
