A volunteer is “a person who willingly offers to perform a service or undertake a task without being paid.”

When I was growing up both my parents were very involved in synagogue and Hadasah. My parents stressed the importance of giving back – that it is a mitzvah to help organizations thrive.

At Or Shalom the volunteering projects are endless. We are a small synagogue that depends on members to keep the synagogue going. That means every member should volunteer in some way.

Too busy? Not interested? Only have an hour or so? We are appreciative of any time you can spare.

Here are a few ongoing projects that you might not know about:

Library and Book Clean Up

Ruth Harmon, of blessed memory assisted by Diana Braunstein started our library and catalogued all the books many years ago. In recent years, members have dropped off books which have not been catalogued and the library is a mess! We are in the process of organizing the library. We meet on designated Sundays and in an hour or two we get quite a bit accomplished. The more people who come, the faster the project goes. Over the years we have purchased more modern prayer books and, as a result, we have many that we don't use anymore. In Jewish tradition, prayer books need to be buried and as of December 2024, we have buried over 50 boxes of books! Cantor Freedman has a contact at Goldsteins and they have graciously buried the majority of books. Hyam Solomon has also buried some boxes. It was an arduous task of packing the books up but with teamwork it we got it done.

Sisterhood is always looking for people to get involved. Mindy Bernstein has been our Sisterhood President for many years and Laurie Katz is the treasurer. Julie Miller has been our kitchen guru for a very long time. Julie lives in Center City and schleps to our synagogue very often. We rely on members to grocery shop for Shabbat luncheons and help prepare food in the kitchen. This is a great way to make new friends! We recently spent time straightening up the drawers in the kitchen. There is endless work to be done! Contact Mindy if you have an idea for a Sisterhood event. She is always looking for new ideas.

Landscaping – Unfortunately, we recently had to start paying for weeding and other landscaping projects because no one volunteered. Services – Many times on Shabbat we do not have a minyan (10 people). If you volunteer to go once a month to a service that would be such a mitzvah. You can even participate in the service on Zoom if you can't be there in person.

Blood Drives – For many years we had a volunteer who worked with the American Red Cross and our synagogue held two blood drives a year. No one has volunteered in several years.

Gift Shop – Binnie Donald, of blessed memory, and Sue Daroff worked countless hours in our gift shop. They went to shows to buy merchandise and kept an inventory. If you want something from the gift shop now, you must make an appointment.

Ritual Committee spends countless hour before the High Holy Days to give parts to our congregants, change the Siddurim and so much more. They make sure the service runs smoothly. David Keet, head of the Ritual Committee could use your help.

Are you handy? We are always looking for people to help with plumbing or electrical issues so we don't have to pay a professional.

Some other volunteering areas are lead services, read Torah or Haftorah, help erect the Sukkah (and take it down).

Our small synagogue needs each and every person to step up and help in some way. Please contact Betsy Cohen or any board member – we are counting on you!

Hoping Against Hope

As I write this article, the fragile ceasefire between Israel and Hamas is holding. Three Israeli hostages have been freed, with more to come in the weeks ahead.

It is a time of guarded optimism as we, along with the entire world Jewish community, continue to hold our collective breaths in hopes of the process continuing apace.

In the meantime, the month ahead will provide us with several opportunities to connect with the Land of Israel in positive ways.

Saturday, February 8 is designated as *Shabbat Shira* -The Sabbath of Song, when we read *Shirat Hayam* - The Song of the Sea, an epic poem of thanksgiving to God for miraculously parting the waters of the Sea of Reeds, allowing our Israelite ancestors to escape Pharaoh and his approaching army.

Shabbat Shira has become an opportunity to celebrate Jewish music as well. In that vein, I will be presenting “*Ilanot Ba-t’filot* - Trees and Pleas,” a look at trees in our liturgy and the ways in which those texts have been interpreted musically. Many of the citations reference trees in *Eretz Yisrael*.

The holiday of *Tu B’Shevat* - is our “Jewish Arbor Day,” as it were, follows a few days later. One appropriate way to mark the day would be to purchase trees in Israel through the Jewish National Fund: <https://www.jnf.org/>. Israel needs our support at this critical time in its history and JNF is one of many organizations worthy of our contributions.

Later in the month, on Saturday, February 22, we will have a “Lunch and Learn” following services on the topic “*Yeitzer Tov V’ra* - The Best and Worst of Us,” where we will examine behaviors, both positive and negative, based on teachings found in the *Torah* and by early rabbinic scholars in Israel.

So as we continue to express our solidarity with Israel in its continuing quest for the release of the hostages in Gaza and a path toward true peace, we can also acknowledge and celebrate the land which is so precious to us.

In last week's Torah portion, we read the story of Moses and the burning bush. That was the bush that burnt, but was not consumed. Moses realized that he was witnessing something miraculous, and so he fully believed that the voice that spoke to him was the voice of God. But that did not prevent him from refusing the request that was made of him. God asked him to go to Pharaoh and demand the release of the Israelites from slavery.

God asked Moses to do something noble and life-saving, but still Moses refused. He made all kinds of excuses and as he did, God countered each one with a solution. This went on for a while until Moses ran out of excuses and finally agreed to do God's bidding.

Moses was the Most Unwilling Volunteer!

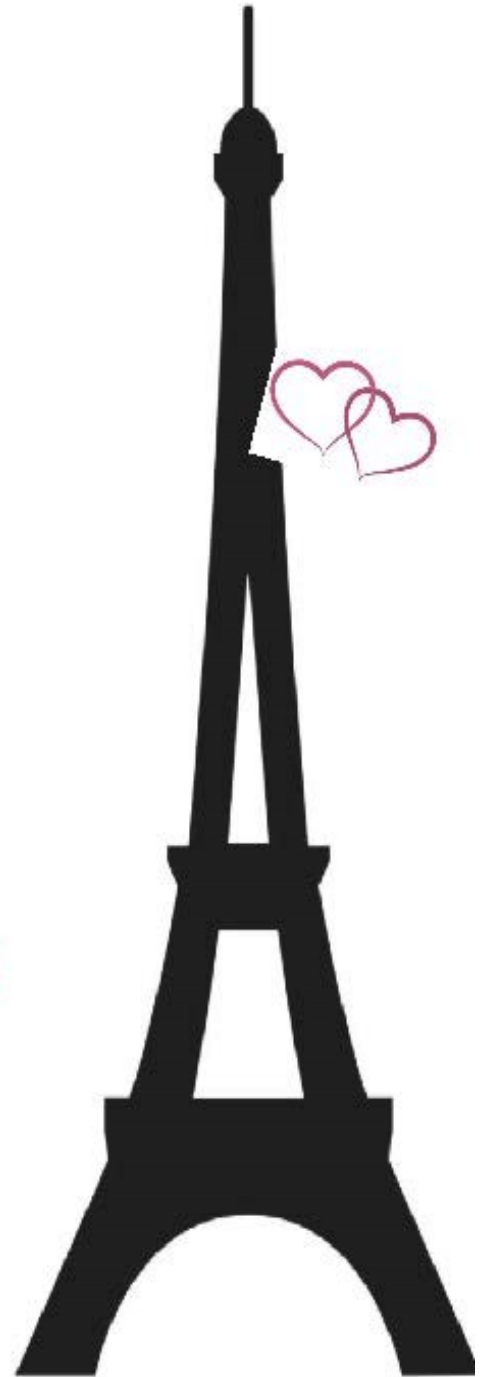

Definition of Funds

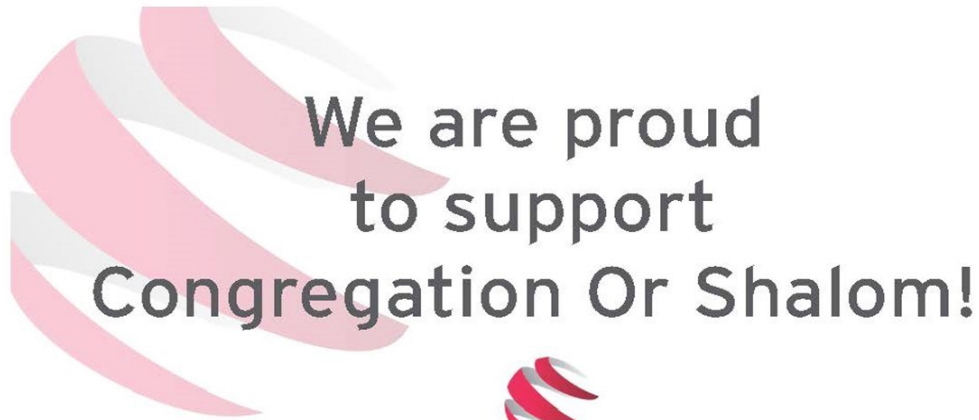

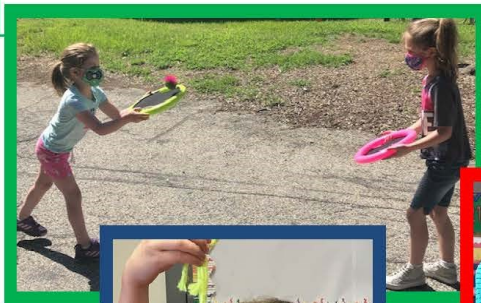
