Spiritual Leader

“The Psalms - Timeless Poetry”

I have a confession to make: I am not a lover of poetry. Well, that’s not exactly true. If it rhymes and is geared toward children, then I’m right there! (Think Shel Silverstein, Dr. Seuss, etc.)

I find most poetry to be too abstract, too obtuse for me to appreciate.

But when it comes to the Book of Psalms, these sacred poems speak to me in profound ways.

I especially love those psalms which are so vividly descriptive, especially as they relate to nature.

One example is Psalm 29,; we read it on *Shabbat* evening and morning. It describes the power of God, a power that is defined by God’s mastery over nature. With just a voice, God has the power to shatter the cedars of Lebanon, to make trees dance like calves, to form flames of fire, to thunder over the waters. It’s pretty powerful imagery!

In Psalm 147, God is described as the One “who covers the earth with clouds providing rain for the earth, that grass may flourish on the hillsides — food for livestock and for the ravens’ crying nestlings.” And later in the text, “...how quickly God’s commands are obeyed: snow piles up like fleece, frost spreads like ash, hailstones are tossed like crumbs — who could withstand the cold?”

That last part sounds an awful lot like this past week’s forecast, doesn’t it!?! As I’m writing this message, I hear the pelting of sleet on the windows and skylights of our home and feel that ice-cold wind each time I open the door to check on how much snow has fallen.

And I'm struck by how the words of this psalm especially come alive, how easy it is for us to relate to the meteorological conditions it describes. (For those of you who are "snowbirds," perhaps less so!")

It's a reminder to all of us that if we really examine the texts of our prayers and our holy writings, we're bound to find clear connections to our world in 2026.

So even though I don't like poetry in general, I love the sacred poetry composed by King David and others thousands of years ago. Their words ring as true today as they did when they were written.

Gazan Captivity - A Survivor's Story

A few evenings ago, I had the honor and privilege of attending a testimony by Omer Wenkert, an Israeli hostage who was released from Gaza, after 505 days of captivity. Today, he is 23 years old. He was barely 21 when he was captured.

For one gut-wrenching hour, Omer described his experiences, first how he arrived with his friend Kim Damti (aged 22) at the Nova dance party at 3am on October 7 2023; then fleeing the site a few hours later when explosions were heard, only to witness a barrage of rockets from Gaza that forced them to hunker down in a bomb shelter a few miles down the road. Over 20 others squeezed into the same shelter, which was designed for less than 10 people. Terrorists discovered them there and attacked them with hand grenades, automatic weapons, and smoke bombs. Omer's friend Kim was killed. Miraculously, he survived but was captured by the attackers. Thus began a long captivity that ended on February 22, 2025.

He related the harrowing conditions in which he was held in Hamas's tunnels, saying they worsened during the Israeli offensive on Rafah, in southern Gaza, in May 2024. The terrorists intentionally starved him, feeding him a half a pita a day for two or three weeks. They did things that seriously endangered his life, for fun. One terrorist stood him up and sprayed insect repellent in his face, with his eyes open. His captor also sprayed everything he would touch. On another occasion, he was beaten with an iron rod, on his arms, legs, and even his head. When he asked his captor why he was doing this, since he, Wenkert, had not caused any harm, he was told that the IDF had killed the terrorist's father, someone who had been an important figure in Hamas.

At first, Wenkert was imprisoned (underground of course) with an 18 year old who had a bullet wound in his stomach. He and his fellow captive were beaten, severely and often. That lasted about a month.

Then he was completely isolated for six and a half months. During this time, his captors would only approach him occasionally. He said that around the 80th day of his captivity, he was moved from one underground corridor to another, which he described as "a dark room with a little lamp".

"They tried to drive me crazy — to damage my sense of time," he said. "When they put down food for me, they told me to turn around, so they could leave. Bathing was once in 50 days, with a little bottle. Only after nine and a half months did I bathe for real."

The tunnel in which he was kept for most of his captivity was about 35 inches wide, and about 30 feet long, with a hole as a bathroom.

“I was on a small mattress, with my back against the wall. I was there for 420 days, I think,” he said. On June 13, 2024, his captors brought fellow hostages Evyatar David and Guy Gilboa-Dalal to the corridor in which Wenkert was kept. His mental state improved tremendously with their arrival. Even though it became more crowded in the tunnel and he had to split the same small amount food and water with them, he loved the company. Also, the abuse stopped. Somehow, the captives got hold of a pack of cards and played a Gazan game similar to rummy. They even played chess with the cards, drawing a board in the sand which was the floor of the tunnel. A king was a king, a queen was a queen, a 10 was a knight and so on. When they became bored with these games, they began a series of “movie nights”. The person whose turn it was would pick a movie or series that he loved and would describe it to the others in great detail. For example, the retelling of a one and a half hour Harry Potter movie took 6 hours and had to be spread over two nights.
